**Coteaux des Travers
Rasteau 2007**

\$14.99 per bottle **or \$161.89** per case

The sleepy town of Rasteau, with its population of less than 700, has become another great source for Southern Rhône wines. Robert Charavin's family has been making wine here since 1931, and he is the fourth generation. It is rich with raspberry fruit and has a gorgeous combination of herbs and spices. It is very well balanced and is simply a stunning value. *This is the kind of red wine you can enjoy now or anytime in the next five years.*

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Alois Lageder

Pinot Bianco 2008

\$12.99 per bottle **or \$140.29** per case

Undoubtedly the star of Northern Italy, Alois Lageder has earned a reputation among the very best producers of white wine in Europe. His drive to produce great wines is legendary. He farms his vines and takes care of his slice of the world with an infectious passion. The 2008 Pinot Blanc has ripe apple and peach flavors typical of this grape. It also has a gorgeous streak of acidity and balance.

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Bisceglia Aglianico 2006

\$12.99 per bottle **or \$140.29** per case

Aglianico is the King of southern Italian grapes and it just might be the most under-appreciated grape on the planet. There are many expensive and excellent examples of Aglianico, but we've been searching for an affordable one and found it! **Bisceglia** is a new winery only founded in 2001 by Mario Bisceglia, whose dream it was to produce world-class wines from his home region. This Aglianico is rich and very well balanced and is a great match for a spicy ragout served over pasta.
